Make a Difference!

Last year we helped pass an Alert system for Washington's missing Indigenous persons. It had a strong start.

Six months in, 22 of 31 missing persons have been found. (Luna Reyna, Crosscut/December 28, 2022)





Legislative process offers multiple entry points for our advocacy

- ➤ When giving our legislators IDEAS for BILLS
- ➤ When a bill is discussed in a POLICY COMMITTEE for each chamber, often with public Hearings in which we can sign in or testify (cutoff date in chamber of origin is 2-17-2023)
- > When a bill is discussed in a FISCAL COMMITTEE for each chamber if there is a fiscal component (cutoff date in chamber of origin is 2-24-2023)
- ➤ When a bill goes to the RULES COMMITTEE
- > When a bill is discussed and voted on in the FULL HOUSE and FULL SENATE
- > When a bill goes to the GOVERNOR

METHODS FOR CONTACTING YOUR LEGISLATORS

The Washington State Legislature offers several methods for contacting legislators, leaving messages, and providing individual positions on bills and subject matters. Methods for contacting legislators are as follows: (1) bill comment form, (2) member e-mail forms, (3) direct email, (4) U.S. Postal Service [using addresses listed on the member directory pages: House / Senate], and (5) by phone. Each method is outlined in detail below.

Furthermore, classes are offered free of charge to those wishing to learn more about the legislative process, navigating the legislative web pages, tracking bills, and searching for RCWs, WACs, bills, and related documents: http://leg.wa.gov/LIC/Pages/classes.aspx.

BILL COMMENT FORM

- Navigate to http://leg.wa.gov.
- 2. Click Bill Information.
- Enter bill number in the Search by Bill Number text box.

- 4. Click Search.
- Click Comment on this bill (located in the upper right hand corner).
- Complete form and submit.

TESTIMONY & CONVEYING YOUR POSITION FOR A HEARING

If you know the number of the bill you want to advocate for, as well as the name of the Committee hearing the bill, you can testify or sign in your position. You can get more information about each of these here. FAN will also send you links for signing in pro/con on bills in our weekly emails. Options include:

1) Testify orally either in person or remotely through zoom

Often the group sponsoring legislation will identify some seasoned speakers to go first

2) Submit Written Testimony

If you do not wish to testify aloud in a committee hearing, you can still submit written testimony on a bill for the legislative record.

3) State Your Position on a Bill Without Testifying

Committee Sign In - Remote Testimony also allows you to select a chamber, committee, and bill, then indicate you wish to have your position noted (pro/con) for the legislative record.

Treat yourself afterwards!





Creating An Effective Message

- Tell your story
- Tell others' stories
- Emphasize your messengers and supporters (gives credibility)
- You don't need to be a policy expert!
- Demonstrate consistency and repetition
- Elevate directly impacted communities
- End with a call to action
- Make an ask and make an ask again



Do's and Don'ts

Don't endorse candidates

Don't get caught in the weeds on policy

Don't think you are unqualified

DO demonstrate shared interests

DO share your story

DO share about who else supports your message

DO keep it brief

DO know your audience

Abbreviated Messaging Examples

Free School Meals for All Students: Providing meals as part of the right to education. This is a pathway to end child hunger and relieve financial burden on families. (Jeff DeBray)

The following paragraph from an op ed by Rep. My Linh Thai is a great example of messaging even though it's not a policy ask):


"I want to live in a Washington where people feel that they belong, that they are trusted, and that their community has their back. Everyone in our state should have the opportunities and support they need to thrive, and the Working Families Tax Credit can help do that. I urge all of you to spread the word to your neighbors and loved ones that this tax credit will be available to them in 2023. Let's make sure every single eligible household applies and receives their cash."
